MAKE A DIFFERENCE ON NOVEMBER 7, 2006

You will continue to hear how the November 7, 2006 election is absolutely critical to the future of Ohio citing economic growth and the retention of public education as we all know it now as two of the most important issues.

We are asking you to consider making election day, November 7, your personal "Make a Difference Day" by doing at least two things that day. First and MOST IMPORTANT---VOTE. Second, the Stark County Board of Elections is in need of persons to work at the polls on the November 7 election day.

There are four poll workers per precinct---two Democrats and two Republicans. There may be more than one precinct located at a specific polling site but there are always four workers per precinct. Poll workers are provided with paid training prior to election day and are paid a flat rate of \$85 per day on election day or \$100 if they are the presiding judge.

Please call the Stark County Board of Elections at 330-451-8683 and tell them you are interested in working that day. They will then ask your political party affiliation to be able to direct your call to the person who will provide you with all the details including where they need you and what specific job they need you to do. They will make every effort to put you as geographically close to where you live as possible and they will assist you so that you may vote absentee prior to that day. Numerous training sessions are provided but you are

only paid for one session. However you may attend as many as you like if you feel you need more practice.

This will be a long day but is also an extremely rewarding one. Teachers are quick to learn, are people oriented, and have proven they have the stamina for many long days---we are just asking for one. Please consider making this huge contribution to add to the list of all that you have done over your many years of professional involvement. Thanks for your consideration of this project.
